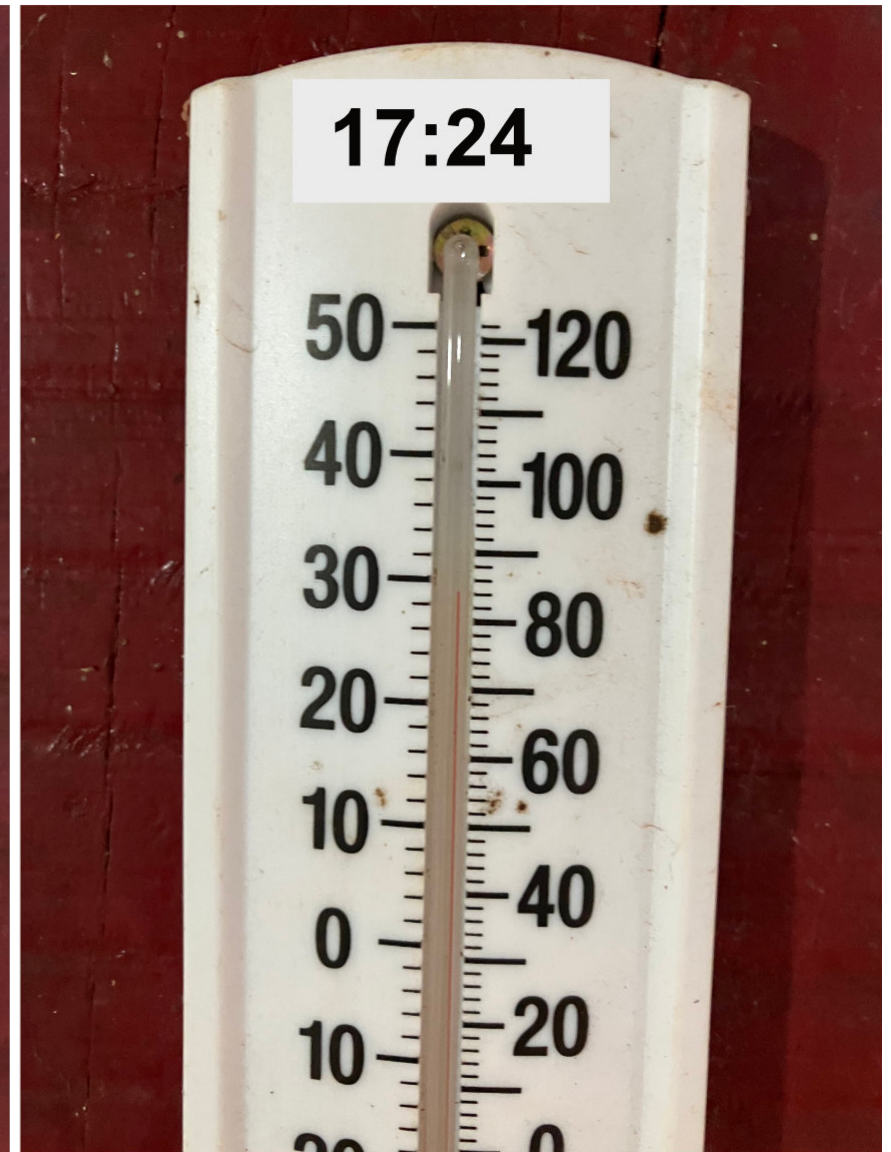
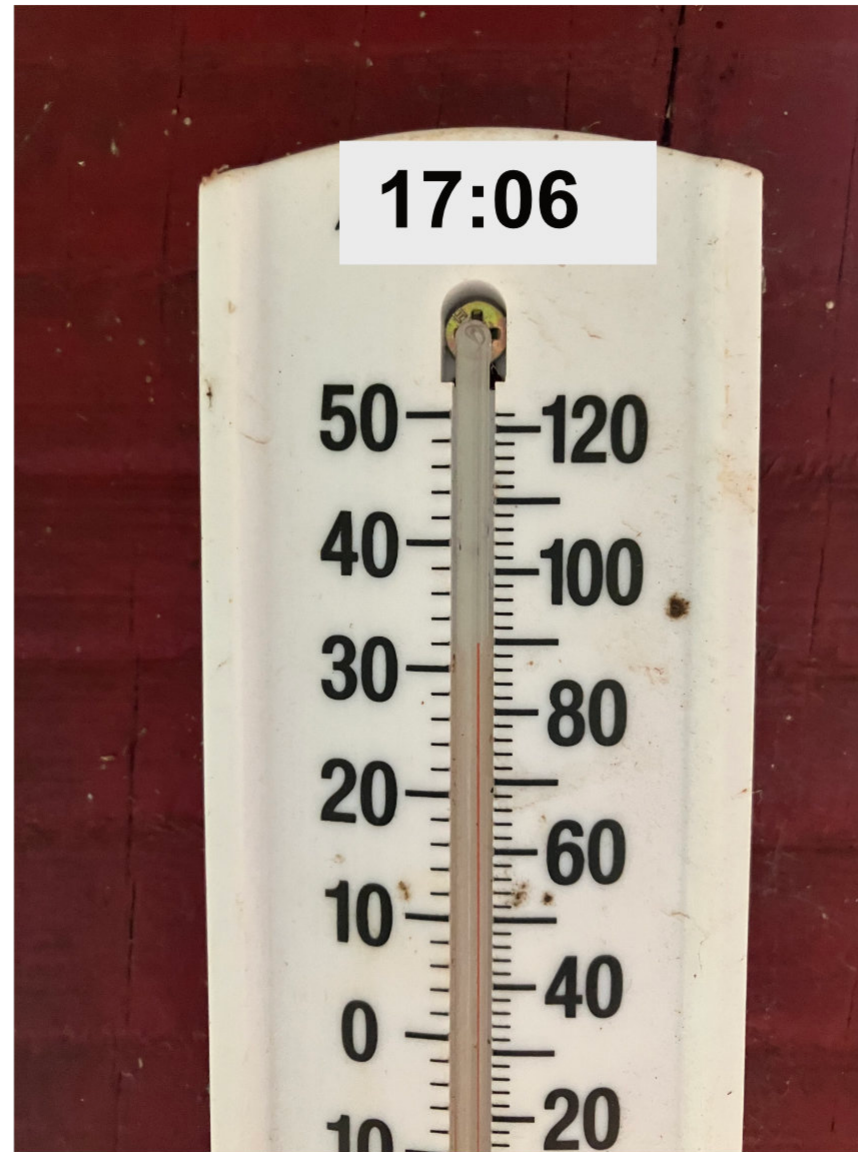
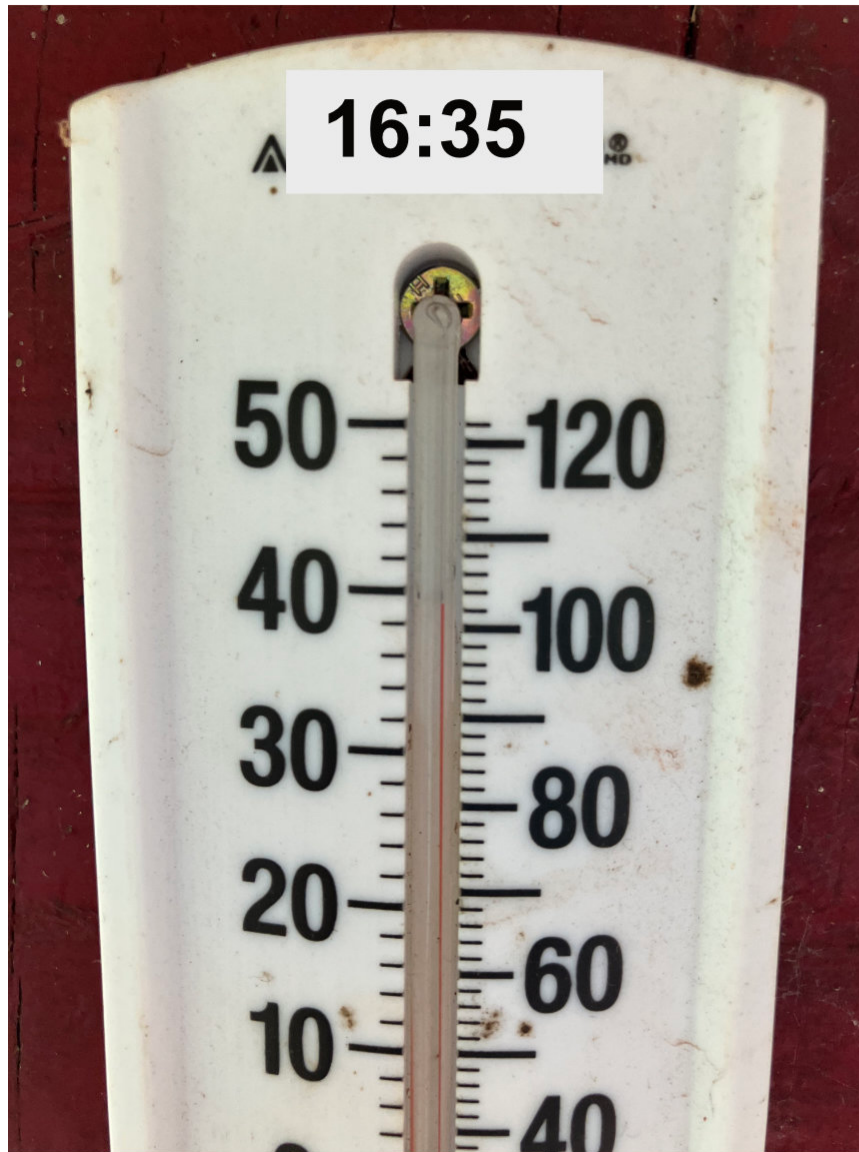


Massive winds moved in on Tuesday, January 9.

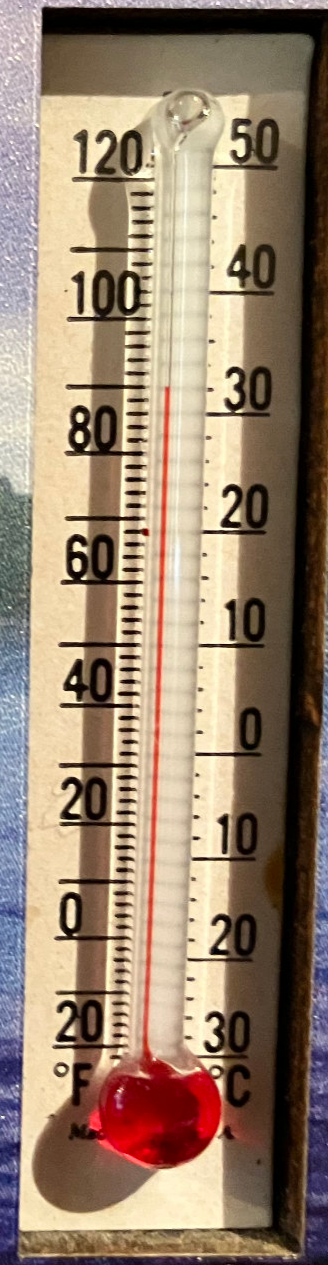

We have finally installed a second air conditioner in the tiny house we live in. We had one in our bedroom, but it could not keep up with the hot humid weather.

Housing conditions vary from mansions to huts often held up by boards with daylight shining through. Many average workers' housing have daylight visible through cracks in the walls, doors, windows and have leaky pipes. The house we live has minimum daylight cracks. It has one window with glass, and the other "windows" are only openings with shutters and bug screen frames.

We keep LED lights on in the attic to deter bats and nocturnal insects like cockroaches from coming in. It seems to work really good. It is a much better method than using bat poisons that we would have to keep breathing in. Since the ceiling of this house is made of nice boards, what you would normally use for a floor, there was daylight shining through as well. At night I would always look at our ceiling like looking at the stars, with the LED light shining through. This Thursday the stars in our ceiling were no more.

Jacob has finally arrived with his "can do" positive attitude and installed a thin layer of insulation on the floor of the attic. Jacob is a Brazilian renovation man. It is always great to see him, because you know when he comes, the job gets done.

Even though our house is small, it is quite nice. There is no bat poop or mould smell anywhere. However some workers live in way worse conditions. They deal with bats and mould on a very dangerous level. That's why we are excited to report on the housing project that has begun this week for the Radio's one worker family.
